

Brig. Gen. Michael T. Brewer, 412th Test Wing Commander and Chief Master Sgt. Brian D. Randolph, 412th TW Command Chief, hosted the event that introduced the honorary commanders to their respective group and squadron commanders.

"The Honorary Commanders Program is one of our key interfaces with the community. We want to join folks up with a commander so you can learn about what it is that we do on base. This provides opportunities for you to come out and join us and see some cool stuff," said Brewer.

Air Force enlisted forces were represented by CMSgt Chris McCollor of the AFTC and by CMSgt Brian Randolph from the 412th Test Wing.

Brig. Gen. Brewer gave a short informal talk. He said the successful operation of the 412th Test Wing is based on four cooperating groups: the military; civil service employees; contractor personnel; and community support of the other three. The Edwards Civ-Mil Support Group showcases the outstanding cooperation of the community. He also said we will get through this budget tightening.

Danny Bazzell, President of Civ-Mil, briefly reviewed highlights of past Civ-Mil service projects for Edwards and its staff:



Higher Grounds is an Internet cafe located at the Building 2423 enlisted dorm. It was set up in July 2007 with the donation of \$50,000 worth of computers and displays. It provides a non-alcoholic recreation space for the airmen, and now includes game consoles.

When the Airman's Attic was expanded into an 8,000 square foot facility, Civ-Mil supplied carpeting for it, including special carpeting for the children's play area. We also installed partitions. The cost was \$18,000. It has been called the finest Airman's Attic of any Air Force installation.

To support deployed airmen, Civ-Mil provides "goodie bags." These include snacks, chewing gum, toiletry articles, books, games, prepaid post cards to send greetings back home, pens and pencils, and a host of other items not easily available through {USAF} channels. Since 2002, over 3,000 bags have been given out.

The Flag Park at Building 1 was installed in 1991. It flies the flags of all 50 states and the US possessions. The flags were just replaced and there are three sets of replacements on hand when they are needed.

Holiday activities supported by Civ-Mil include the Holiday Meal Program, the Angel Tree of children's gifts, and Holiday Gift Baskets for the junior enlisted. These have been coordinated by the First Sergeants Council, and recently assisted by other sponsors.

Contributions to the Civ-Mil Edwards AFB projects are held in a separate fund.

Operational Civ-Mil funds are in a separate account.

During the past year, Northrop Grumman generously donated \$5,000 to Civ-Mil for its Edwards activities. Lockheed Martin has made a similar generous donation of \$4,000. Those donations were acknowledged by President Bazzell.



The 412 Test Wing recently inducted Honorary Commanders. The program was originated by Civ-Mil several years ago. Several of the new Honorary Commanders attended. Most of the Civ-Mil Directors were present, in addition to many members.

2013 Annual Project Possibilities

On February 6, 2013, Dennis Shoffner gave my wife Diane and me a very nice tour of Edwards AFB. During this tour, we visited Higher Ground, the Flag Park and the museum, along with a number of other attractions.

From this visit, we were able to arrive at the following possible topics to consider for the 2013 annual project:

"Higher Ground" would like to upgrade their coffee bar to a barista style machine. While at approximately \$2,000 the cost is not prohibitive, the executive committee decided that the proper use of such a machine would require on-going training and a continuing flow of supplies that we could not monitor, nor commit to on an ongoing basis. Accordingly, we will not give further consideration to this request at this time. However, their request for new controls for their video game consoles is still under consideration and we are in the process of gathering more specific information on the exact types, numbers and costs of these units.

George Welsh, director/curator of the Flight Test Museum, indicated that they are in need of two flat screen televisions to enhance their abilities to show historical and educational film footage. Since our visit, they received one television from another source and we are still considering the possibility of satisfying their need for the second set.

Our visit to the flag park revealed that the name plaques are in need of cleaning from water stains and that a small number of them are bent and in need of repair or replacement. These plaques are 24"X6", are made of bronze and



are mounted on aluminum mounting brackets. We explored the possibility of replacing them, but after speaking with Dennis Persons of "Chapel of the Valley Mortuary", and doing some other research, we found that this would be a very expensive proposition. An on-line source quoted a price of \$385.00 to produce one replacement plaque. There are 54 flags and the total cost would be over \$20,000 to replace all of them.

We are in the process of researching the best way to clean the existing ones and determining whether the damaged ones can be repaired. The Board is updated on the progress with respect to the above on a monthly basis.
