On October 9th, President John Fergione and Civ/Mil Board members Danny Bazzell, Mike Belzil, Pan Patel, Terry Landsiedel, Lisa Moulton and Art Furtado, were treated to a tour of the local courthouse, arranged by fellow board member Richard Spann, a retired Judge. Spann believes that it is good for both the public and the Court to have open tours and discussions to foster a better

understanding of what the public expects and the Court process involves. The tour, which was led by a Sheriff's Deputy, allowed access into many areas which are not seen by the general public. These included the metal detectors upon entry, where the x-rays of purses and bags were visible, detention rooms for people suspected of bringing contraband into the courthouse, the Sheriff's control console monitoring all courtrooms, the hallways, lock-up and the dedicated parking area for courthouse employees. The group also saw the Judge's lunch room, the armory with its many varieties of weapons and the underground lockup with its monitored sally port where the inmates' busses arrive. They had an opportunity to view one of the four courtrooms being fitted out as the last of the unfinished courtrooms are being prepared for use, as well as an operational courtroom where the various processes were explained, along with the several security systems within the courtroom. They also had an opportunity to meet Supervising Judge Lisa Chung and Assistant Supervising Judge Christopher Estes. Those who attended were quite vocal in their enthusiasm for the tour as well as for those who acted as tour guides. Judge Spann hopes to offer future tours as the make-up of Civ/Mil changes and for those who could not attend.

In a related matter, several people associated with Civ/Mil were involved in the first graduation of the Veterans Court in the North District (Antelope Valley) of the Superior Court. Colonel David Radomski, Vice Commander of the 412th Test Wing, served admirably as keynote speaker for the ceremony. Lt. Colonel Dale Reidel, Commander of the Edwards AFB JAG office, also attended. Judge Spann also served as the liaison between the Base and Judge Estes, who presides over the Veterans Court. This is one of the specialty courts which has been created to assist veterans, who have been charged with a felony, to clear their records. The veterans who are eligible must have had little if any contact with the court system and must complete a rigorous 18 to 24 month program which is closely monitored by the Court and with the Department of Veterans Affairs. Many suffer from PTSD, alcoholism, and/or drug dependency, and some have been charged with domestic violence. Successful completion allows their felony conviction to be expunged, thus enhancing their chances for employment. This is a win/win program.

Anyone interested in a future courthouse tour should notify Judge Spann of their interest.

JOHN ESCH INSTALLED AS NEW DIRECTOR FOR AIR FORCE PLANT 42

On Wednesday, November 4th, the Air Force's 412th Test Wing Operating Location Air Force Plant 42 in Palmdale received its new Director, Mr. John B. Esch. An installation ceremony was held at Air Force Plant 42 and was attended by Plant 42 employees, 412 TW leadership, and representatives from the various contractors on the installation. Officiating the ceremony was Dr. David G. Smith, Installation Support Director, Edwards AFB.



John Esch comes to Air Force Plant 42 from McCarran International Airport in Las Vegas where he was the Airside Control Operations Manager. He was responsible for the Airport Control Center, all ramp activities, and gate scheduling for the world's 8th busiest airport (based on aircraft movements). Mr. Esch's span of control entailed collaborating with 33 tenant airlines and 5 interagency partners to ensure safety and security for over 42 million passengers per year. His annual budget authority included a \$5M payroll and the collection of \$23M in ramp and gate fees. His leadership also directly contributed to nearly \$300M in runway and ramp refurbishment projects.

Prior to joining the team at McCarran, John enjoyed a 32-year career with the US Air Force as an enlisted member, officer, and a civilian. He entered active duty in the security forces field, and later, after commissioning, became an air traffic control / airfield operations officer. His last federal services assignment was as a civilian terminal instrument procedures specialist assigned to HQ Air Mobility Command. Mr. Esch's deployment history includes Operations Eldorado Canyon, Allied Force, and multiple Enduring Freedom tours, to include commanding the 376 Expeditionary Operations Support Squadron, Manas Air Base, Kyrgyzstan. Mr. Esch is a qualified Joint Duty Officer. "JB" is married to the former Molly earl of Herrin, IL. They have three grown daughters and one granddaughter.

Air Force Plant 42 is home to NASA aircraft operations, major defense contractors such as Boeing, Northrop Grumman, and Lockheed Martin, and employs about 9,000 people. The installation provides command and control of the airfield complex and industrial facilities for production, modification, depot maintenance and flight test of U.S. aerospace systems.

Edwards Civ-Mil holds 26th annual BBQ

8/5/2015 - PALMDALE, Calif. -- As the rain poured down July 30 at Hacienda Lane Ranch in Palmdale, members of the Antelope Valley and Edwards Air Force Base communities gathered under awnings and fellowshipped. Just 30 minutes later the skies cleared, they dried all the tables and chairs and then enjoyed the 26th Annual Edwards Air Force Base Civilian Military Support Group Barbecue.

"The barbecue is just one more social at Civ-Mil. We spend all of our time trying to raise money to benefit Edwards AFB in some way; in the interim, we get together and have some fun and do some social things," said John Fergione, Edwards AFB Civ-Mil president.

While there is some modest fundraising at the barbecue, the main purpose is for the Civ-Mil members and leaders and the new commanders at Edwards to get to know each other.

Maj. Gen. David Harris, Air Force Test Center commander, and his wife Valene, were in attendance along with Brig. Gen. Carl Schaefer, 412th Test Wing commander, and his wife Pauline.

The Schaefers were stationed at Edwards several times before returning as the command team of the test wing. This year's barbecue was their third and each one has been an encouragement to the family. *cont. on Page 6*

"It's awesome to see the patriotic folks that we have in Southern California; to know that this is really a team sport," said Schaefer. "They understand the value and the sacrifice that our military members and their family members make day to day and this is a great connection point for them and the military."

Civ-Mil is run by 21 directors that meet on the second Thursday of every month. They ask base leadership about the wants and needs of the Airmen and then do their best to raise funds and meet those needs.

They have offered and provided support to Higher Grounds, Airman's Attic, Hearts Apart and the Chiefs Group, to name a few. When possible, they also host senior Air Force officials to show them what the Antelope Valley has to offer.

This year, Civ-Mil donated money to maintain the Flag Park on Rosamond Blvd. across from Bldg. 1. There are 56 flags in the park that are on display year-round. According to Fergione, the wind and heat is "brutal" on the flags so they need to be replaced every few months. Each set of flags costs over \$1,000 to replace and Civ-Mil donated enough money to purchase the next four sets of flags.

"I'm a veteran. I remember when I was that age, we needed the help and just being recognized is sometimes all it takes," said Fergione, a Navy veteran who flew A7-Es off the U.S.S. Forrestal. "Our relationship with Edwards is as good as it's ever been and we work at keeping it good. Civ-Mil is 100 members strong right now and we've got more applications that we hope to approve next month."

At the end of the night, Civ-Mil invited Francis Lane to dine at the Odyssey Restaurant in North Los Angeles as a guest of the executive board. A gift presentation for Lane is made every year as a thank you for hosting the barbecue at her ranch for the last 26 years.

Attendees also included U.S. Congressman Steve Knight (CA-25) and former Air Force Test Center commander retired Maj. Gen. Doug Pearson.

"Edwards Air Force Base enjoys, in my humble opinion, the best relationship with the community that I've ever seen at any base," said Schaefer.
