President's Remarks

The Hearts-Apart Program at Edwards is a monthly program AFB hosted by the Edwards Airmen Family and Readiness Center {AFRC} for spouses and family members of the Edwards Airmen, who are deployed or on a remote tour assignment. At any given time, approximately 150 families are affected by

these deployments. The AFRC gives spouses and families face-to-face contact with the staff, counselors and Base leadership. As a method to encourage these interactions, meals and entertainment are provided. While the AFRC does conduct fundraising activities at Edwards AFB, the funds they raise are generally less than what they would like to have to fund this, and other related programs, properly. Other related programs include "Bundles for Children", Volunteer Appreciation events, and Key Spouse Training.

In September, Civ-Mil donated \$2,000.00 to help defray the expenses of the Hearts-Apart program. The AFRC used this donation to provide Thanksgiving meal vouchers, catered meals at the monthly get-togethers and family fun passes at both Mulligan's and the Edwards Bowling Center. In December, we allocated an additional \$2,000.00 for this program. My hopes are that we will have sufficient funds to continue to support this most-important program as we enter 2016.

Edwards Emergency Relief Fund {EERF}, a program managed by the Edwards First Sergeants' Council, is designed to provide financial assistance to Airmen in The individual circumstances where an Airman requires assistance are numerous, and encompass lodging, airfare for memorial services, child car seats, and many others. The examples of "individual circumstances", which encompass the overall EERF, seem to grow monthly. The Edwards First Sergeants' Council provides this financial assistance based on the funds they have available at the time. In October, Civ-Mil donated \$10,000.00 to support this program. A grant was also received that month from the Northrop Grumman Corporation for \$5,000.00, which was designated for the Edwards Exceptional Family Member Support Program. This

program is one of many that comprise the overall EERF. Thus, based on donations received to Civ-Mil, and the generosity of the Northrop Grumman Corporation, the Edwards Emergency Relief Fund received a total of \$15,000.00 in October 2015 to assist the First Sergeants' Council in funding this most-necessary program.

Our 3rd Annual "Welcome to the Antelope Valley" reception was held at the Pioneer Event Center {PEC} on Friday, January 29, 2016. This community outreach reception was held to introduce the many opportunities available in the Antelope Valley to the new and established military members, as well as our allied nation visitors at Edwards AFB. One hundred seventeen {117} USAF and allied nation visitors at Edwards Air Force Base, as well as local community businessmen and women, were present at the PEC on the evening of the reception. Forty-Seven {47} vendor organizations were also represented, and the business services they collectively offered are too numerous to mention in this column. All of the reports I have received from the attendees following the event were positive. My sincerest thanks are forwarded to Past-President Danny Bazzell, who chaired the committee that planned and executed the reception, and committee members Amy Beck {RAF}, Kathy Fergione, Director Terry Landsiedel, Director Rhonda Nelson, Marlies van de Pol {RDAF}, Michelle Slade and Charlotte Welling.

Civ-Mil contributed \$500.00 and took part in the activities at the 412 Test Wing Awards' Ceremony that was held on the Base on February 18, 2016.

In March 2016, Civ-Mil provided one hundred {100} tickets for each day of the Los Angeles County Airshow, which was held on March 19 - 20, 2016. The tickets were provided to the Airmen at Edwards AFB to allow them to attend this spectacular event. The Board of Directors of the Los Angeles County Airshow offered us discounted tickets for this purpose. We allocated \$3,000.00 in providing this opportunity to our Airmen.

In April, Civ-Mil provided \$500.00 towards installation of an outdoor speaker system at the new dormitory pavilions. Civ-Mil also provided \$1,000.00 to the Higher Grounds Internet Café for the purchase of items that were requested. Both of these expenditures were requested by the Edwards AFB First Sergeants' Council.

Since 2016 began, Civ-Mil has had some new members join the Group. I would like to welcome The Antelope Valley Mall, Randy L. Ciapponi and Citizens Business Bank as our newest members.

Congratulations to Director Stan Turner on his retirement from the Edwards Federal Credit Union on April 30, 2016.

Our next Spring Mixer is scheduled for the evening of May 4, 2016 at Domingo's Mexican and Seafood Restaurant in Lancaster. NASA Preparing for Fourth Series of Flight Tests of Unmanned Aircraft



NASA and its partners are validating and advancing technologies that will assist the Federal Aviation Administration as they develop regulations to integrate Unmanned Aircraft Systems into the National Airspace System.

NASA and its partners, General Atomics Aeronautical Systems, Inc., Honeywell International and the RTCA Special Committee (SC)-228, are validating and advancing technologies that will assist the Federal Aviation Administration as they develop the regulations to allow integration of Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS) into the National Airspace System (NAS).

The upcoming flight test series will be the fourth for the project, also known as Flight Test Series 4, FT4, and will be based out of NASA's Armstrong Flight Research Center in California. Flights will begin toward the end of April and continue through June.

Test objectives will require 15 flights and more than 270 encounters. These encounters will consist of flying several piloted aircraft, referred to as intruders, into different positions near or around NASA Armstrong's Predator B remotely piloted aircraft, Ikhana.

Intruder aircraft will include NASA's B200 King Air, T-34C, GIII, TG-14, Honeywell's C-90 King Air and the U. S. Air Force's C-12 King Air. These intruders will function as high speed and low speed aircraft to verify and validate the requirements of the minimal operational performance standards for UAS.

FT4 will leverage lessons learned and risk reduction from FT3, which took place last summer, while continuing to introduce new capabilities and technology refinements in support of validating the Detect and Avoid (DAA) systems. These systems will allow Ikhana to detect intruders and either alert its pilot on the ground or fly a programmed maneuver to avoid collision.

Each of the intruders will be equipped with different systems for operations in the NAS. They will represent aircraft equipped

with cooperative systems, such as a transponder, as well as non-cooperative aircraft which have no equipment and will require an air-to-air radar to detect and track.

"Our engineers have generated a very detailed and complex flight test plan that integrates all of the variables needed to execute this flight test," said Heather Maliska, UAS-NAS Deputy Project Manager at Armstrong. "This flight test plan coordinates the DAA systems, intruder aircraft equipment and speeds, design of encounter geometries, and the number of intruder aircraft needed to conduct the encounter in order to meet NASA's and the community's requirements."

In preparation for the flight tests, engineers are completing ground testing and validating software before the flights begin. Following ground testing, crews will conduct check out flights to ensure the systems work in flight and that researchers get the data they need.

The data retrieved from this round of flight tests will provide valuable information to researchers for a future round of flight tests as well as play an important role in evolving the technologies that are necessary for UAS to fly in the NAS.

"NASA is providing critical data to support the ongoing efforts to develop technical standards for both sensor data links", said Paul McDuffee, Co-chair of RTCA's Special Committee 228. "The UAS community looks forward to the results of this historic flight test campaign."

NASA's participation includes Armstrong, Ames Research Center in California, and Langley Research Center in Virginia.

Rocket Lab hopes a little inspiration can launch careers in STEM

4/20/2016-EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. -- Sixty local middle school students delved into the world of rocket science with a visit to Air Force Research Laboratory's Propulsion Directorate April 19.

From lessons on chemical propellants to seeing actual rocket boosters that were launched, the 8th-graders from Discovery School in Lancaster, California, got a whirlwind tour of the "Rocket Lab."

The learning experience was part of the propulsion directorate's education outreach in conjunction with President Barack Obama's My Brother's Keeper initiative, which is meant to ensure that all young people can reach their full potential. The president is joining with cities and towns, businesses, and foundations who are taking steps to connect young people to mentoring, support networks, and the skills they need to find a good job or go to college and work their way into the middle class.

The president also has stressed the importance of expanding science, technology, engineering and math programs for young people.

"We are trying to inspire junior high school students to become scientists and engineers," said Kriss Vanderhyde, AFRL Education Outreach manager. "We found that the best way to do that is to get them out to one our sites, get them to do some hands-on functions like building rockets and show them what kinds of things are possible in an engineering and science career."

The day began at the Rocket Lab's Heritage Room where the children got up close and personal with old rocket boosters and engines, some both used and tested at Edwards.

Next were tours of the Chemical Laboratory and Electric Propulsion Lab.

After lunch provided by the school, the hands-on part of the tour began with students being separated into groups or "program management teams." Each group was to build a rocket out of a two-liter soda bottle, tape and manila folders.

"We're known as the 'field trip school' and we focus a lot on the Antelope Valley's history and places because it's in our backyard," said Stephanie Faber, Discovery School teacher. "Discovery School has an AVID and STEM based curriculum. For our 8th graders, we have three modules and one of them is Flight in Space." After all the rockets were built and inspected, each of them were filled with some water and placed on a launch pad where they were pressurized. Then, the countdown begins and the rocket is launched into the stratosphere. In this case, the stratosphere is about 100 feet off the ground. But, the intent is to show the students that learning is limitless.

"It isn't really that hard to get there, they just need a little inspiration. That's what we're trying to do; providing that inspiration to get them on track and maybe get them to think, 'hey, this science and engineering is really not bad, maybe I should check it out," Vanderhyde said.

After the rocket challenge the students finished off the day with a chemistry demonstration by AFRL scientists.

T-38C Passes in Front of the Sun at Supersonic Speed



An Air Force Test Pilot School T-38C passes in front of the sun at a supersonic speed, creating shockwaves that are caught photographically for research.

NASA is using a modern version of a 150-year-

old German photography technique -- schlieren imagery -- to visualize supersonic flow phenomena with full-scale aircraft in flight. The results will help engineers to design a quiet supersonic transport. Although current regulations prohibit unrestricted overland supersonic flight in the United States, a clear understanding of the location and relative strength of shock waves is essential for designing future high-speed commercial aircraft.

Goldfein nominated as 21st CSAF

WASHINGTON (AFNS) -- Defense Secretary Ash Carter announced April 26 that the president has nominated Air Force Vice Chief of Staff Gen. David L. Goldfein to be the 21st chief of staff of the Air Force, succeeding Gen. Mark A. Welsh III, who has served in the position since 2012.



"I'm extremely humbled by the nomination to serve as the Air Force's 21st chief of staff. If confirmed, I pledge to serve our Airmen and their families unwaveringly and honor our remarkable heritage and legacy of integrity, service and excellence," Goldfein said. "I also look forward to joining my fellow service chiefs as a member of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. General Mark and Betty Welsh continue to be exceptional stewards of our service, and Dawn and I are honored to follow in their footsteps."

Goldfein entered the Air Force in June 1983 as a graduate of the U.S. Air Force Academy. He has been assigned to numerous operational, command and staff positions. He currently serves as the vice chief of staff, where he presides over the Air Staff and serves as a member of the Joint Chiefs of Staff Requirements Oversight Council and Deputy Advisory Working Group.

"I am pleased to support the nomination of General David Goldfein as our next chief of staff," said Air Force

Secretary Deborah Lee James. "General Goldfein possesses the experience and vision needed to address dynamic global challenges and increasing military demand. He knows how to build and sustain key partnerships, has important warfighting experience, and will exercise the critical judgement required to balance our manpower and resources as we shape tomorrow's Air Force. There is not a better person to lead our Airmen into the next century of airpower dominance."

Prior to his current position, Goldfein was the director of the Joint Staff at the Pentagon in Washington, D.C., where he assisted the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff in fulfilling his responsibilities as the principal military adviser to the president and secretary of defense.

"Dave Goldfein is an Airman who epitomizes warrior leadership, and that's exactly what our Air Force deserves," Welsh said. "He connects deeply with Airmen, he supports their families relentlessly, and he absolutely recognizes the criticality of our service's mission. Most importantly, he and Dawn understand the remarkable privilege they've been afforded in serving the nation."

Carter also spoke at a ceremony April 29 at the Pentagon, in which he congratulated Goldfein on his selection.

From his experience at the highest Air Force levels and the joint force, Goldfein "understands deeply the evolving nature of warfare and the threats we face," the secretary said.

Goldfein, he added, has "developed a keen appreciation for the strategic horizon ... and the need to develop resilient cyber and space capabilities, which will allow the United States to continue to dominate across all domains."

If confirmed by the Senate as the next Air Force chief of staff, Goldfein's "extensive political-military experience will be to our great benefit as we continue to accelerate our efforts against ISIL, and work with coalition nations to deal them a lasting defeat," Carter said.

Goldfein is a command pilot with more than 4,200 flying hours in the T-37 Tweet, T-38 Talon, F-16C/D Fighting Falcon, F-117A Nighthawk, MQ-9 Reaper, and MC-12W. He has flown combat missions in operations Desert Shield, Desert Storm, Allied Force, and Enduring Freedom. Goldfein has received numerous awards for his military service including the Defense Distinguished Service Medal with oak leaf cluster, the Legion of Merit with two oak leaf clusters and the Distinguished Flying Cross with Valor device and oak leaf cluster.
