

VANDENBERG AFB VISIT A SUCCESS

Twelve members of the EAFB Civ-Mil Support Group and three guests departed the Antelope Valley in the early morning of February 12. After braving the cold Antelope Valley winds through Mojave and the rain, sleet, snow and fog in the Tehachapi's, the group arrived at Vandenberg AFB a little after noon.





Located on the western California coast between Santa Maria and Point Conception, Vandenberg AFB was formerly a US Army Base, Camp Cooke. It was renamed Vandenberg AFB in 1958 after General Vandenberg, the 2nd Chief of Staff of the USAF. Vandenberg AFB is home to the 30th USAF Space Wing, 14th Air Force.

A fter meeting up with our tour guide, Ms. Jennifer Green (that's Jennifer second from the left. John Coutley is furthest to the left) from the Public Affairs office, we were briefed by Colonel Carl J. Frushon, the Launch Group Commander, on the mission of Vandenberg AFB. Their main mission is to launch satellites southward into low polar orbit and test launch platforms, which are launched, to a benign, and hopefully uneventful, splash down in the Pacific, in a westerly direction. Vandenberg offers a complimentary capability to Cape Canaveral which, due to surrounding landmasses and other countries, can only launch Space Shuttles and satellites in an easterly direction. For the same reasons, Vandenberg can only launch to the south and the west.

We then attended a walking tour through the Western Range Operations Control Center (WROCC).

This is a large facility, which houses all of the personnel necessary to insure an efficient and safe event on launch day. 2Lt Pierre Gregoire gave us an excellent and most informative tour of the facility.

We stayed on Vandenberg AFB that night and all of us were treated to a clean and spacious ground floor room at the Visitors Quarters.

On the second day we added a second tour guide to our group, Mr. John Coutley. John also works in the Public Affairs office and has worked at Vandenberg AFB for 56 years.

Vandenberg AFB contains many Space Launch Complexes (SLC's), each designed for the type of rocket being launched (the USA has many). These are the actual launch pads and they are all controlled by the one WROCC. They are scattered along the northern and southern extremes of the 100,000+ acre base.

Thanks to one of our members, Al Hoffman, who made a phone call to a Boeing facility there, we were treated to an unplanned tour of SLC-6 by Mr. James Boyle, the Site Manager of United Launch Alliance. SLC-6 was originally built as a second facility to launch the Space Shuttle. It was modified to launch the Delta IV rocket (a model of it is shown to the right) which sends the heaviest payloads into polar orbit. What a great addition to the planned tour.

We then proceeded to do a drive-by of the SLC's. John Coutley is a wealth of knowledge and briefed us all along the way on base facts and other "neat to know" trivia. We even had to stop once to let some deer cross the road in front of us.





W ith our tour complete, we made our way home. With highways 5, 58 and 138 closed due to snow, we took the southern route via Santa Barbara, Ventura and Santa Clarita. Though it took longer than planned, we got to see some beautiful views of our southern California beaches and the breathtaking Pacific Ocean. What a fabulous way to spend a couple of days.
